How can you see collections?



Right now, the Wildling Art Museum is exhibiting its private collection of the art of America's wilderness through March 21 in Los Olivos. Some of the places you visit charge an entrance fee, but there are many opportunities to visit for free! With your Santa Barbara Educators' Passport any child, K-6 grade, and one adult can visit the member institutions for free! What is a collection?
