This Month's Theme: Fall Birds in Santa Barbara County Passing Through!

Every year many different bird species migrate along a major north-south route called the "Pacific Flyway" that runs from Alaska to Patagonia, in South America, in the spring and fall. Some of the birds are traveling great distances following food sources, traveling to breeding grounds, or traveling to a safe location to wait out the winter season. The birds fly roughly the same route every year and usually at about the same time. The migration of some species is so predictable that bird lovers can often guess to the day when a particular bird species will show up in their area.

Santa Barbara County, part of California's Central Coast, is located on the Pacific Flyway. With its islands, coastal plain, estuaries, forests, and interior valleys, the county holds important habitats for many different species of birds.

Central Coast Birding Trail

Did you know there is a "Central Coast Birding Trail"? It is located within four counties: Monterey, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura The trail highlights a variety of places where you can go for good birding opportunities. Within these four counties are 83 excellent birding sites and eight "Globally Important" bird areas. Santa Barbara County has 25 sites on the Central Coast Birding Trail.



Christmas Is The Time To Count Birdsl

California offers birders the opportunity to help scientists by picking a preassigned day to count as many different bird species as they can find during December and January. Participants are usually assigned to teams based on their bird-identification skill. There is a small fee to help pay for the cost of tabulating and publishing the results. Santa Barbara birders will be doing their counting on January 2, 2011. Last year, 220 people participated and counted 216 different species of birds!
